II. Guest Speaker: Jack Hinojosa, Child Development Resources

- CDR organization information. Head-start (preschools 25, throughout the county), 1965, grant based, federally funded (up to 3 years of age). Serve about 1300 children. Early head start (0-3 infants) for pregnant mothers. Services for the entire family. CRD—subsidized

childcare, can get reimbursed for childcare needed for qualifying families. CalWorks Stage 1 program. Gradual release of assistance. Can help families provide referrals for childcare as well. Families need to have a social security number for the parent guardian. They do not check for legal status. 1100 families on their waiting list. Serves children up to age 13 through subsidized childcare program. No after school care program, due to lack of funding. Resource and Referral office to help with setting up opening a day care. 805-485-7878 ext. 512 number in information packet, for childcare or if parents need to know what to look for quality childcare. Working to get a location in Thousand Oaks. CDRV.org applications online as well. Need to be documented for CDR to train people for early childhood care. Phone number CCIP, can ask information on how to get started with opening a center or receive training. Training available all year. They do accept Tax ID numbers. Explains contents of folder. CDR will provide any of the documents in Spanish.

- Suzanne Godinez new direction of early childhood development. Corporate offices in Oxnard, serve all of Ventura.

III. **Guest Speaker:** Betty Stapleford—Clergy and Laity United for Economic Justice (CLUE) and American Association of University Women (AAUW)

- Organization is located Thousand Oaks. Speaker's focus is in undocumented high school students. What do they do after graduating from high school? CLUE—Clergy and laity in economic justice.
- What is it that we can do to make a difference in the lives of undocumented students?
- AAUW and CLUE sponsor a program in Thousand Oaks High School. They provide documented and undocumented students with information on what to do after high school. They are finding out what it is that students need and how they can help them. Looking to help students get DACA (Deferred action for childhood arrivals) status, Know your Rights training. There is a big trust issue with these students. This is new territory for them.
- At TOHS, they are working with ten students. Open invitation for all school sites to come to the meeting, I8 Sandra Martinez's room. 3:00pm after school on Thursday, twice a month. Promoted through Sandra. They want to mix documented and undocumented, dreamers and their allies. Want everyone to feel comfortable and safe. Everything is confidential and safe during meeting. Many Dreamers can return to speak to inspire these students. Many of the Dreamers have graduated from CLU, CSUCI. It's a work in progress type of group that is identifying the needs of their members.
